





 German industry is famous for quality, reliability, engineering, efficiency.


Robotic parking lot, Wolfsburg.

Etiquette

- ➤ Observe hierarchy, titles, lines of authority.
- > Address with last names only
 - Herr/Frau Bockmayr, never Fräulein.
 - An introduction may simply be,
 "Schmidt hier" (for oneself)
 or "Herr Schmidt" (when introducing another).
 - Titles must be precise.


Etiquette

- ➤ Dinner with colleagues...
 - Runs late into evening.
 - Customers may be served at different times.
 - OK to drink alkoholfreies Bier.
 - Health conscious; smoking uncommon.
- Out with the boys...
 - May become drunk & loud.

- Germans deal with stress and uncertainty by structuring their environment.
 - Monochronic.
 - Highly engineered physical and social systems.



> Most highly rule-based culture in the world.



Guilt-based culture

- Guilt feelings over WWII, Holocaust
 - Avoidance of flags, patriotism.

- > Risk aversion.
 - Like bridge building: double the safety margin.



Brooklyn Bridge, 1883, designed by Johann August Röbling

Got his start in Saxonburg, PA

Built 3 bridges in Pittsburgh, including 6th Street bridge, 1859 (replaced 1892, 1928)

Female heads of state often occur in masculine cultures


Privacy

 - "Coconuts" and "peaches."






- Re-enchantment of nature in a secular world.




Ruhr Valley

 - Nature shows on TV




- German "green dot" recycling program.
 - 1991 law required recycling.
 - Pushed by the Green Party (Die Grünen).
 - Introduced by Duales System Deutschland (DSD).
 - Now governed by EU.
 - Operates in 23
 European countries
 - 130,000 participating companies.

Anthropomorphizing of pets




- ➤ Western-style music.
