


• German industry is famous for quality, reliability, engineering, efficiency.

Etiquette

Observe hierarchy, titles, lines of authority.
Address with last names only

- Herr/Frau Bockmayr, never Fräulein.
- An introduction may simply be, "Schmidt hier" (for oneself) or "Herr Schmidt" (when introducing another).
- Titles should be precise.

Etiquette


Dinner with friends/colleagues...

- Runs late into evening.
- Customers may be served at different times.
- OK to drink alkoholfreies Bier.
- Health conscious; smoking uncommon.
- > Out with the boys...
 - May become drunk & loud.

- Sermans deal with stress and uncertainty by structuring their environment.
 - Monochronic.
 - Highly engineered physical and social systems.



German "green dot" recycling program.

- 1991 law required recycling.
 - Pushed by the Green Party (*Die Grünen*).
 - Introduced by Duales System Deutschland (DSD).
- Now governed by EU.
 - Operates in 31
 European countries
 - 130,000 participating companies.





Grüner Punkt (green dot) recycle bins




